RE: Bulletin 2020-06 COVID-19

A Message to Licensees and Consumers:

On May 19, 2020, Kansas Governor Laura Kelly, issued executive order EO-20-34 implementing Phase 2 of the Ad Astra Plan. (<https://governor.kansas.gov/executive-order-no-20-34/>)

The order provides it will become effective at 12:00 a.m. on May 22, 2020 and will remain in force until rescinded or until the statewide State of Disaster Emergency proclaimed on April 30, 2020, relating to COVID-19 expires, whichever is earlier.

The order states that businesses under the jurisdiction of the Board of Cosmetology may continue to be open under Phase 2 by pre-scheduled appointment and online check-in only and if in compliance with the business restrictions provided in the order.

Please be advised that local governments retain authority to issue and enforce equally or more restrictive orders or provisions and retain any authority to issue or enforce isolation or quarantine orders or other orders restricting movement as necessary to respond to escalating or worsening conditions in any local jurisdiction. This is a rapidly changing situation and it is incumbent on the salon owner to keep informed of the daily developments. Licensees should check with their local health department to ensure more strict orders are not in place that would prevent opening.

Business Restrictions:

1. Pre-scheduled appointment and online check-in only
2. Maintain at least 6 feet of distance between customers or groups of customers;
3. Follow fundamental cleaning and public health practices detailed on covid.ks.gov; and
4. Avoid any instances in which groups of more than 15 individuals are in one location and unable to maintain a 6-foot distance with only infrequent or incidental moments of closer proximity.

This does not limit the total occupancy of a business but requires that businesses limit mass gatherings in areas and instances in which physical distancing cannot be maintained, such as at tables or in entrances, lobbies, break rooms, check-out areas.

As always, you are required to adhere to the infection control regulations already in place for your profession that you operate under everyday. All KBOC laws and regulations can be accessed on the KBOC website: <http://www.kansas.gov/kboc/StatsandRegs.htm>

Schools:

The order advises that higher education facilities that are closed before May 18th should remain closed for in-person learning or events involving groups of more than 15 individuals present at a time. We understand that this leads to confusion as to whether cosmetology schools can open their clinic floors for instruction and business if they are able to adhere to the required restrictions. School administrators should seek guidance from their local health department on whether they are permitted to open and obtain any other additional requirements or guidelines the county may have.
